Types of grades or scores

Types of assessment and grades

The majority of A level students take exams or submit coursework for each subject at the end of the course. They receive only a grade for each subject. For example, Mathematics - A

Some A level students study modular A levels. This means that the course is divided into modules or units. They take formal assessments for each unit and are awarded a score. These scores are called Uniform Mark Scale or UMS.

A high school transcript is a certified record of your academic achievements. It's sometimes referred to as a marksheet, statement of results or academic certificate.

We're asking for a high school transcript because you said that one or more of the following applies to you:

- you do not have 6 or more GCSEs/IGCSEs or 5 or more Scottish National Qualifications
- you took GCSEs/IGCSEs or Scottish National Qualifications exams more than 3 years (36 months) ago
- you do not have, or are not currently studying AS or A levels, Scottish Advanced Highers or International Baccalaureate

Getting your transcript

Getting a transcript from your school or college can take several weeks, especially if they are busy or closed for holidays. We recommend that you ask your school or college for your transcript as early as possible. Check if there's a specific person you need to contact or process you need to follow.

If your transcript is not in English, you will also need to allow enough time to have it translated. We only accept transcripts in English. You must not translate the transcript

yourself. It must be translated by your school/college or an official translation service and authorised with a stamp, watermark or signature.

It may disadvantage your application if your transcript is late or you do not provide one.

Information to include

The transcript should be an official document or certificate from your school or college. It must list your academic achievements, including as much information as possible about your exam performance and any non-exam assessments (such as coursework). It should include:

- your full name
- your date of birth
- subjects you have taken
- grades you achieved
- dates when you took your exams

Your transcript should cover the last two years (24 months) of school or college.

If you're still in school or college, do not include predicted grades or exam results you are waiting for. These should have been submitted through your UCAS application.

The transcript should have a watermark, stamp or letterhead from your school or college.

The transcript does not need to include:

- references
- predicted grades
- detailed project work
- non-academic achievements

You should not edit the transcript in any way.

Submitting your transcript

The easiest and recommended way to provide your transcript is to upload it here and submit My Cambridge Application by the deadline.

You will not be able to return and upload the transcript after submitting My Cambridge Application.

If you are unable to upload the transcript to My Cambridge Application – for example, due to a technical issue or because your school or college will only send it directly to Cambridge – then either you or your school/college must email the transcript by the same deadline.

If you do not have access to your transcript by the deadline, you or your school/college can email it after the deadline. However, it will be at the discretion of your chosen or allocated Cambridge College whether to consider it.

Make sure you submit My Cambridge Application by the deadline, even if your transcript is late or unavailable. If you do not, it will invalidate your application.

What is a university transcript?

A university transcript is a certified record of your academic studies.

It should include:

- your full name
- your date of birth
- subjects you have taken
- grades you achieved
- dates when you took your exams

It needs to be in English and include a watermark, stamp or letterhead from your university.

Getting your transcript

Ask your university to provide a transcript. Allow enough time to get the transcript - it may disadvantage your application if you do not provide one.

If you submit your My Cambridge Application without a transcript, you cannot return to the application to upload one at a later date.

You must include your full name, UCAS personal ID number and the course you applied for. It's much quicker and easier to upload a transcript with your application.

6 Interview

Who sees this section?

All applicants see this section. However, mature applicants with a January deadline will be given interview dates from the **last week in March to the first week in April**.

6.1) Will you be available for interview during the first 3 weeks in December, if selected?

Make sure you keep the interview period free. We cannot reschedule, unless under exceptional circumstances.

Interviews at Cambridge are online or in-person, depending on the College you apply to and where you live.

The information you give here will help our College administrators to schedule interviews.

6.2) Tell us the date(s) when you will not be available for interview and the reason why

If you have an unavoidable commitment, we will try to avoid arranging an interview on that day.

Example of reasons we accept include:

In most cases, we cannot schedule interviews around events such as:

- sports matches
- concert rehearsals

This question is only for applicants who left school in 2025, or will leave school in 2026.

If you're selected for an interview, interviewers may ask questions based on what you've studied.

Tell us about the subjects and topics you've studied as part of your AS and A Levels, or any equivalent qualifications. These are usually taken in the final 2 years of high school.

If you're still at school or college, include the subjects and topics you studied during the 2024 to 2025 academic school year. Also include what you expect to study up to the end of November 2025.

If you've finished school or college, include subjects and topics studied in the final 2 years of high school.

Adding your subjects and topics

Include all your subjects, and list the topics for each one. For example, in Biology, you may have studied the topics:

'Biological molecules, Cells, Organisms exchange substances with their environment, Genetic information, variation and relationships between organisms, Energy transfers in and between organisms'

If you do not have enough space to list all the topics, you can shorten topic titles, use abbreviations or add the subject again to include more topics.

7 Photo for university ID card

Why you need to provide a photo

The photo will be used on your university ID card, if you become a student at Cambridge.

It may also be used as identification at interview, if you're selected.

The photo is not used as part of the selection process.

Digital photo requirements

Use this guidance to provide a suitable photo for an ID card.

Use a plain light-coloured background

- no patterns or textures
- no objects or people behind you

Even lighting and no shadows

- balanced light - no shadows on your face or behind you
- it's best to use natural light, for example facing a window

Face in full view and plain expression

- face forwards with eyes open, looking straight at the camera
- plain expression, with mouth closed
- include your head, shoulders and upper body in the photo
- your photo should be a good likeness

No headwear

Unless it's for religious or medical reasons.

Eyes fully visible

- hair away from your face and eyes
- no 'red eye'
- take your glasses off (if you can)

If you need to keep your glasses on:

- no sunglasses or tinted glasses
- your eyes must be visible without any glare or reflections

Do not take a photo of another photo

You must upload an original photo. Do not take a photo of a printed photograph (such as your passport photo) - it will not be accepted.

We follow the [UK Passport Office rules for digital photos](#) under the [Open Government Licence v3.0](#).

7.1) Upload your photo

The photo must be:

- clear and in focus
- in colour
- unaltered by filters that add textures or special effects

These are the key updates that we have made to My Cambridge Application since the previous application cycle.

You've applied to study Modern and Medieval Languages - Course code R800

"Classical Latin (ab initio)" has been added as an option. Applicants can choose this option if they have no previous experience of the language.

Does your school or college provide extra lessons to support preparation for STEP in Mathematics?

A link to the [Sixth Term Examination Paper in Mathematics \(STEP\)](#) web page has been added to the guidance, so that students can find out how to register and prepare for STEP.

Your AS and A levels with Percentage Uniform Marks (PUM)

The sentence "We may ask you to provide evidence of your PUM once your application has been received" has been replaced with the following:

"You must tell us about every unit you've taken, even if you failed it or took it again to improve your score. This includes the original unit score and all later attempts. You need to upload a high school transcript

We've added more guidance:

- Getting a transcript: We recommend applicants ask their school or college as early as possible, as the process can take several weeks and the transcript may need to be translated into English.
- What to include - and what not to include: For example, applicants do not need to include predicted grades.
- Submitting the transcript: If the applicant is unable to upload the transcript to My Cambridge Application – for example, due to a technical issue or because their school or college will only send it directly to Cambridge – it must be emailed by the

applicant or school/college by the same deadline as My Cambridge Application. If it is sent after the deadline, the College will decide whether or not to accept it.

What topics have you studied?

More guidance has been added about how to list topics. The character count of the topics field has been increased to 300 characters.

Would you like to add a personal statement?

We've expanded the guidance to reassure applicants that not providing a personal statement will not disadvantage their application. This section is optional, but applicants may find it useful if they want to explain their interest in a course offered only at Cambridge. Or, if applicants ran out of space in their UCAS personal statement, they may want to add more about how they have explored their academic interests. We will read the personal statement alongside the UCAS personal statement.

Do you have any extenuating circumstances that we should know about?

The list of examples of extenuating circumstances has been expanded. We've added a note advising applicants that if their teacher, doctor or social worker has already included this information in their UCAS reference, they do not need to submit it again to Cambridge.

We're now asking applicants who have to do compulsory military service for a period of 2 years to tell us here.

These are the key updates that we have made to My Cambridge Application since the previous application cycle.

'Were there any difficulties with the teaching of your AS level, A level or equivalent subjects?'

The sentence 'Do not include disruption due to the COVID-19 pandemic' has been removed from the guidance as it is no longer relevant.

'You need to upload a high school transcript' and 'You need to upload a university transcript'

We've added more detailed guidance to help applicants upload a high school transcript and university transcript.

'Where do you plan to be, during the first 3 weeks in December?'

This is a new question in the 'Interview' section to help us understand if applicants are going to be in the UK or outside the UK during the interview period. If applicants answer that they plan to be outside the UK, we go on to ask:

- 'What country and time zone will you be in, during the first 3 weeks in December?' (if they plan to be in one country outside the UK)

- or
- 'What countries will you be in during the first 3 weeks in December?' (if they plan to be in two or more countries outside the UK)

We ask for this information so that we can try to schedule online interviews at an appropriate time for applicants and interviewers.

'Photo for university ID card'

We've added more detailed guidance to help applicants upload a suitable photo to be used on their university ID card, if they become students at Cambridge.

'Do you have any extenuating circumstances that we should know about?'

The following examples of extenuating circumstances have been added:

- 'become estranged from your family, and you are living independently'
- 'refugee status, or you're an asylum seeker'

'Is there anything else you want us to know?'

The following sentence has been added to the guidance: 'Very personal or sensitive information should be submitted to us through an extenuating circumstances form (see the previous question).'
