

## Undergraduate tuition fees 2019-20

This document applies to you if you are intending to apply to Cambridge to commence studies in 2019-20.

- 1) Colleges collect all fees on behalf of the University.
- 2) In order to know which fee you will be charged, the College will look at:
  - a) Your **fee status** (expressed as either “home/EU” or “international/overseas”)

Fee status depends on both nationality and residency. Further guidance is available but, in short, if you are a UK or EU national **and** have been resident in the UK or EU for the last three years up until 1 September before the course starts, you are likely to have “home/EU” fee status. Otherwise, you are likely to have “international/overseas” fee status, but please note there are a number of exceptions to the rules: you will normally need to provide further information about your family history, parental employment, your education and your recent residence to enable a decision to be made.

- b) Your **previous highest qualification at the point of matriculation**

This only needs to be considered if you are a “home/EU” student, and will dictate whether or not you (a) should be charged the regulated fee – which is the fee which the University is permitted to charge by the government – and (b) can access tuition fee loans through Student Finance England. If you already have a first degree or equivalent, you normally are not eligible for tuition fee loans, and are subject to paying the fees listed under the “Second UG degree” column in the table on page 2 and the separate College Fee (as indicated by the + signs in the table), except if you will be studying medicine, veterinary medicine or architecture.

- 3) If you are categorised by your College as a home/EU student, and you will be studying your first undergraduate degree, your tuition fee will be expressed as a single amount (that the University and the Colleges share). This also applies if you are a home/EU student under 2(b) above studying architecture, medicine or veterinary medicine.

Otherwise, your tuition fee will be expressed in your formal offer as two separate amounts, which correspond to a University fee and a College fee. The precise amount of the fees will depend on both your course and your College, as outlined in the table overleaf.

\* In Mathematics, and some of the Engineering and Natural Sciences subjects, you may continue onto an “advanced undergraduate degree” leading to a Masters qualification (M.Math, M.Eng, M.Sci). For these subjects, the course is considered continuous with the corresponding undergraduate BA course and the corresponding annual fee continues to apply.

§ Regulated fees for Home/EU students: the University's ability lawfully to charge Home/EU students less than overseas students depends on the Education (Fees and Awards) (England) Regulations 2007 and as amended. The University commits to charging fees at a level no higher than the maximum fee loan and intends to set its fee at that maximum level. The UK Government has confirmed a level of £9,250 for 2019-20, and there is currently no information for the annual level for future years of the course.

EU nationals: the University also confirms that students who qualify for the regulated fee (as defined in the legislation above) in 2019-20 will continue to be eligible for the regulated fee for the full duration of their course.

## Additional College fees to calculate the combined fee

Each of the Colleges is a separate institution, and you are required to be a member of both a College and the University to study. College fees differ because they are set independently by each College. You are strongly advised to view the Colleges' pages in the undergraduate prospectus and College websites to gain a full understanding of the character of each of the Colleges as you make a decision about your application.

\* Additional points apply for the following Colleges:

Magdalene College: The fees are fixed for the first three years of the course only: for fourth and subsequent years, the fee will be fixed at the rate that applies at the beginning of the fourth year of study.

Trinity College: Fees are not fixed for the duration of the course and are set annually [this will be not more than the RPI rate of inflation plus 1%]. In addition, please note the full tuition fee for 2019-20 is £13,340, but all students are awarded a 45% fee bursary.

Wolfson College: Fees are not fixed for the duration of the course and are set annually [currently, this fee rise is projected at 4% per annum].

### Terms and conditions for fees fixed for the duration of the course

- Where fees are fixed for the duration of the course, these are the fees agreed at the point of admission for the relevant course, or for part of the course as specified elsewhere.
- Where students change their course for one or more years of their degree, and the new course is listed in a different Fee Group in the table on page 2, they will instead be charged for those years the fee for that Group as stated for the year of commencement of their first year of the B.A. degree. This applies particularly for students taking Medical and Veterinary Sciences for the third year of their studies.
- Students who intermit (irrespective of the period of intermission or the number of intermission periods) will remain subject to the fee or fees that were in place at the point of admission for the relevant course, except for students who intermit continuously more than six terms, who will instead be charged at the new fee rates that apply at the time of their return: any associated extension to the duration of the course will be charged at those new rates.
- Continuing as an undergraduate student beyond the initially-agreed length of the course will be charged at the fees rates that apply at the beginning of the agreed extended period for the remainder of the course for a fixed period of three years. Further periods of extensions and fees applicable will be reviewed at that point.
