Some A level students study modular A levels. This means that the course is divided into modules or units. They take formal assessments for each unit and are awarded a score. These scores are called Uniform Mark Scale or UMS.

Why you need to provide a photo

The photo will be used on your university ID card, if you become a student at Cambridge.

It may also be used as identification at interview, if you're selected.

The photo is not used as part of the selection process.

#### Digital photo requirements

Use this guidance to provide a suitable photo for an ID card.

Use a plain light-coloured background

- no patterns or textures
- no objects or people behind you

### Even lighting and no shadows

- balanced light no shadows on your face or behind you
- it's best to use natural light, for example facing a window

#### Face in full view and plain expression

- face forwards with eyes open, looking straight at the camera
- plain expression, with mouth closed
- include your head, shoulders and upper body in the photo
- your photo should be a good likeness

#### No headwear

Unless it's for religious or medical reasons.

#### Eyes fully visible

- hair away from your face and eyes
- no 'red eye'
- take your glasses off (if you can)

If you need to keep your glasses on:

- no sunglasses or tinted glasses
- your eyes must be visible without any glare or reflections

Do not take a photo of another photo

You must upload an original photo. Do not take a photo of a printed photograph (such as your passport photo) - it will not be accepted.

We follow the <u>UK Passport Office rules for digital photos</u> under the <u>Open Government Licence v3.0</u>.

### 7.1) Upload your photo

The photo must be:

- clear and in focus
- in colour
- unaltered by filters that add textures or special effects
- in portrait orientation
- at least 640 pixels tall and 480 pixels wide
- at least 25 KB and no more than 10 MB
- a JPG, PNG or HEIC file

These are the key updates that we have made to My Cambridge Application since the previous application cycle.

### 'Were there any difficulties with the teaching of your AS level, A level or equivalent subjects?'

The sentence 'Do not include disruption due to the COVID-19 pandemic' has been removed from the guidance as it is no longer relevant.

### 'You need to upload a high school transcript' and 'You need to upload a university transcript'

We've added more detailed guidance to help applicants upload a high school transcript and university transcript.

#### 'Where do you plan to be, during the first 3 weeks in December?'

This is a new question in the 'Interview' section to help us understand if applicants are going to be in the UK or outside the UK during the interview period. If applicants answer that they plan to be outside the UK, we go on to ask:

- 'What country and time zone will you be in, during the first 3 weeks in December?' (if they plan to be in one country outside the UK)
   or
- 'What countries will you be in during the first 3 weeks in December?' (if they plan to be in two or more countries outside the UK)

We ask for this information so that we can try to schedule online interviews at an appropriate time for applicants and interviewers.

#### 'Photo for university ID card'

We've added more detailed guidance to help applicants upload a suitable photo to be used on their university ID card, if they become students at Cambridge.

#### 'Do you have any extenuating circumstances that we should know about?'

The following examples of extenuating circumstances have been added:

- 'become estranged from your family, and you are living independently'
- 'refugee status, or you're an asylum seeker'

### 'Is there anything else you want us to know?'

The following sentence has been added to the guidance: 'Very personal or sensitive information should be submitted to us through an extenuating circumstances form (see the previous question).'
