

This document applies to you if you are intending to apply to Cambridge to commence studies in 2026-27.

- 1. Colleges collect all fees on behalf of the University.
- 2. In order to know which fee you will be charged, the College will look at:
 - a. Your fee status (expressed as either "Home" or "International")

Fee status depends on both nationality and residency. Further guidance will be available but, in short, if you are a UK national and have been resident in the UK for the last three years up until 1st September before the course starts, you are likely to have "Home" fee status. Otherwise, you are likely to have "International" fee status, but please note there are a number of exceptions to the rules: you will normally need to provide further information about your family history, parental employment, your education and your recent residence to enable a decision to be made.

b. Your previous highest qualification at the point of matriculation

This only needs to be considered if you are a "Home" student, and will dictate whether or not you (a) should be charged the regulated fee - which is the fee that the University is permitted to charge by the government - and (b) can access tuition fee loans through Student Finance England. If you already have a first degree or equivalent, you normally are not eligible for tuition fee loans, and are subject to paying the fees listed under the "Second UG degree" column in the table on page 2 and the separate College Fee (as indicated by the [4] footnote in the table), except if you will be studying Architecture, Medicine or Veterinary Medicine.

3. If you are categorised by your College as a "Home" student, and you will be studying your first undergraduate degree, your tuition fee will be expressed as a single amount (that the University and the Colleges share). This also applies if you are a Home student under 2(b) above studying Architecture, Medicine or Veterinary Medicine.

Otherwise, your tuition fee will be expressed in your formal offer as two separate amounts, which correspond to a University fee and a College fee. The precise amount of the fees will depend on both your course and your College, as outlined in the table overleaf.

[1] In Architecture, Design, Chemical Engineering and Biotechnology, Computer Science, Engineering, Manufacturing Engineering, Mathematics, and Natural Sciences subjects, you may continue onto an advanced undergraduate degree leading to a Masters qualification (M.Arch, M.Des; M.Eng; M.Math; M.Sci). For these subjects, the course is considered continuous with the corresponding undergraduate BA course and the corresponding annual fee continues to apply.

[2] If you have been classified as a Home student and qualify for the government-regulated undergraduate tuition fee (the 2026/27 regulated fee rate is currently to be confirmed (TBC) pending an announcement by the government; as soon as possible following the announcement on 2026/27 regulated fees, this document will be updated accordingly and re-issued), you will be charged a single tuition fee for each academic year. The University's policy is to charge the maximum regulated fee. To reflect increased costs of delivery and maintain a high-quality student experience, the University will therefore increase fees in line with any uplift determined by the UK Government in the second and subsequent years of your course. The government's stated default indexation assumption is that fees should rise with forecast (the Retail Price Index excluding mortgage interest payments) inflation. The University will notify you of any fee increase by not later than June prior to the start of the next academic year. If you are dissatisfied with the proposed increase, you have the right to terminate your contract with the University.

[3] Fee rates for students with International fee status will be fixed at these rates for the duration of the course.

[4] For these courses you need to add on a College fee to calculate your final fee, with the exception of Home (Second UG degree) students on Architecture, Medicine and Veterinary Medicine courses (these are subject to the 2026/27 regulated fee currently to be confirmed (TBC) pending an announcement by the government; as soon as possible following the announcement on 2026/27 regulated fees, this document will be updated accordingly and re-issued), which are exempt from the College fee

Year Abroad, and incoming exchange

- Home Student (First UG degree) going away from Cambridge during their course has a fee liablility 15% of the full fee
- Home Student (Second UG degree) and International Student going away from Cambridge during their course has a fee liability of 50% of the full fee
- Students coming to Cambridge for a year, in most circumstances (i.e. student exchanges), won't be charge a direct fee, but always check with your home institution



Additional College fees to calculate the combined fee

(Applicable to Home Students doing Second UG Degree and International Students - see footnote [4] above)

Each of the Colleges is a separate institution, and you are required to be a member of both a College and the University to study. College fees differ because they are set independently by each College. You are strongly advised to view the Colleges' pages in the undergraduate prospectus and College websites to gain a full understanding of the character of each of the Colleges as you make a decision about your application.

<u>Magdalene College</u>: The fees are fixed for the first three years of the course only; for fourth and subsequent years, the fee will be fixed at the rate that applies at the beginning of the fourth year of study.

The fee from 2026-27 for students who matriculated in 2023-24 is £11,745.

 $\frac{\text{Trinity College:}}{\text{awarded, resulting in a net fee of £13,689.}} \text{ The fee for students who matriculate in 2026-27 will be £19,557.} \text{ For all students liable to pay this fee a 30% bursary will be awarded, resulting in a net fee of £13,689.} \text{ This fee to be fixed for the period these students are undergraduate members of the College.}$



Terms and conditions for fees fixed for the duration of the course

- a) Where fees are fixed for the duration of the course, these are the fees agreed at the point of admission for the relevant course, or for part of the course as specified elsewhere.
- b) Where students change their course for one or more years of their degree, and the new course is listed in a different Fee Group, they will instead be charged for those years the fee for that Group as stated for the year of commencement of their first year of the B.A. degree.
- c) Students who intermit (irrespective of the period of intermission or the number of intermission periods) will remain subject to the fee or fees that were in place at the point of admission for the relevant course, except for students who intermit continuously more than six terms, who will instead be charged at the new fee rates that apply at the time of their return: any associated extension to the duration of the course will be charged at those new rates.
- d) Continuing as an undergraduate student beyond the initially-agreed length of the course will be charged at the fees rates that apply at the beginning of the agreed extended period for the remainder of the course for a fixed period of three years. Further periods of extensions and fees applicable will be reviewed at that point.
